Report on actions in the California State Legislature this month.

Key action occurred on a few of our priority bills recently, and I want to share that with you. Also, you can now find our priority list on our website (sierraclubcalifornia.org). A more updated version of the list will be posted later today. As noted on the introduction on the list, it reflects a very small number of the bills we are tracking, but also reflects those that are garnering and deserve the most attention.

So here are the updates on just a few of our priority bills:

AB 1745 (Ting) (SUPPORT)--The bill that would help clean up the air and protect public health by sending a strong signal to accelerate the production and adoption of zero-emission cars by prohibiting the sale and registration of brand-new polluting cars in 2040 stopped moving at the author's request. Asm. Ting plans to return with a version next year.

AB 3001 (Bonta) (SUPPORT)--A forward-looking bill designed to make sure greenhouse gas emission impacts are considered during standards-making for buildings and appliances has stopped moving at the author's request. He plans to bring a similar bill back next year.

SB 827 (Wiener) (OPPOSE)--The very controversial bill sponsored by California YIMBY that would have preempted local zoning control around transit stops failed to pass in its first committee. The bill had collected broad and deep opposition from tenants rights, social equity, labor, anti-racism and transit advocates. You can find the very thorough committee analysis here: http://leginfo.legislature.ca.gov/faces/billAnalysisClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180SB827. The bill failed in committee, 5 to 4. Four other members of the committee did not vote, but some of those spoke against the bill.

SB 834 (Jackson) and AB 1775 (Muratsuchi and Limon)--Both of these bills are essentially identical. They would prevent the construction of pipelines and other infrastructure that crosses state lands or waters to serve new oil derricks in federal waters. This is a bill that will help prevent the Trump Administration from expanding offshore oil extraction in California. The bills passed through both of their policy committees and are now headed for their respective house's appropriations committee.

SB 1316 (Glazer) (SUPPORT)--This bill would open a pathway to resolve the longstanding conflict about what to do about 3,400 acres of grasslands and blue oak woodlands commonly referred to as Tesla Park. The area is owned by the state agency that builds and operates off-road vehicle parks. Sierra Club and many other organizations would like the land to be preserved as a low-impact park. The bill would grant the State Department of Parks and Recreation authority to sell the area to a group to preserve the land and prevent it from becoming an environmentally damaging OHV park. The bill passed in its first committee this week, and is headed to a second committee next week.

First, talk with a Sierra Club volunteer and ask how you can help? The Sierra Club is over 500,000 strong and over 99 % are volunteers and got started just this way.

WAYS TO HELP!

Lead and design local hikes in your neighborhood. To be a hike leader, the first step is to go on a hike and see what it is like. Then when you have gone on 5 hikes, sign up for the Angeles Chapter's Leadership Training Seminar, held each spring and fall, sign up for and earn a First Aid and CPR Certification by a authorized source, and plan and conduct a "Provisional Hike" with an experienced hike leader as your assistant leader and who will share with you the high points and the areas for more learning. Talk with the Outings Chair of the Group or Section that you feel most comfortable with. Keep in mind, that in the Sierra Club, you only lead the hikes that you want to lead. You are never told that you have to lead a specific outing.

Participate in events. These can be just going to a rally and participating. They can also be letter writing campaigns on an issue. Others can be attending public meetings and even speaking for a few minutes on the topic, making your points to the officials. Often, just showing up can make a very positive impression.

Newsletters and Communication with members. Keeping in touch with all of our members is always important. People to write articles, enter information about upcoming events and hikes on social media such as Meetup, Facebook, etc. Is this something you would like to do?

Hospitality. Sierra Club members enjoy receiving great hospitality when they come to a meeting or event. If you like to bake cookies, chop up veggies for munchies, or other refreshments, this might be your niche.

NOTE; AS WE PUBLISH THIS, THERE IS THE POSSIBILITY THAT THE NATIONAL FOREST WILL CLOSE THE ACCESS ROAD FOR DAM REMOVAL – Check with the leaders before coming on the hike. 9 mi, 2245' gain/loss. We may see early wildflowers as we make a steady but moderate ascent to the shady trees at Bear Spring. It's another 3 mi to the top of Santiago Peak, but we won't go that far today! If we feel like it, however, we may detour to visit Holy Jim Falls on our way back. We will meet up at the dirt parking area on Plano Trabuco/Live Oak Road where they cross Trabuco Creek. Directions are take Alicia Pkwy from I-5 east approx. 5 miles to Santa Margarita Pkwy, R on SMP to the east end at Plano Trabuco, L on Plano Trabuco all the way to the Trabuco Creek Bridge. Please notify leaders if you wish to join this hike, if you can drive, and how much room you have for additional passengers, as we will carpool over a bumpy dirt road into the Holy Jim Parking Lot. Low clearance cars such as a Prius are not recommended past the dirt parking area so plan to carpool with others there. Bring at least 2 qts water, hat, lunch, hiking boots. Come with us on our 9 day, 8 night fly-drive excursion to eastern Utah to explore and enjoy two of the most unusual and interesting National Parks: **Arches National Park** with over 2000 arches ranging from a few feet in size to several hundred feet and **Canyonlands National Park** with the deep canyons of the Green River and the Colorado River as they join to form the majestic Colorado we all know and love.
